No model soldier stores, sadly, but I did find a very nice bookstore with some interesting books on Caribbean history.






Toronto Chapter's February Meeting



Visit to **Batoche** Saskatchewan By Alex Monsour

Last September, while visiting our daughter in Saskatoon, we drove up to Batoche, the National Park of the battlefield site. It was here that the Metis under the leadership of Louis Riel and Gabriel Dumont fought against Canadian government forces under Major-General Middleton in May 1885. The site is well maintained and considered a place of tribute by the Metis peoples of today. At the time, Batoche was an important trading station and ferry depot along the TransCanada highway that went from Fort Garry in Manitoba to Fort Edmonton. It was interesting to learn that the Metis farms had been set up as long strips along the Saskatchewan river based on the New France settlements. This layout clashed with the Ottawa bureaucrats that had carved the prairies into squares for settlement. The Metis were considered to be squatters by the Federal government and had to be removed. Although the Metis held out for 4 days they were badly outnumbered and outgunned. Riel was hanged for his involvement. Dumont escaped to work in Buffalo Bill's Wild West show and eventually actually pardoned. As we know, both are now considered heroes especially in Saskatchewan.




Behind me were the Metis positions during the battle.



Saint Antoine de Padoue Church

The church and the rectory are the only buildings remaining from 1885. The priest surrendered both immediately to Middleton upon his arrival and they were spared in the battle.







This is the old TransCanada highway with the ferry crossing just ahead. To the right are foundations of the some of the businesses that existed in 1885. Further along you can still see the ruts from the wagons that traveled the highway.



In the visitor centre, I was surprised to see this display. It is a diorama of the last day of the battle made up of toy soldiers. High quality matte figures not some amateurish glossy types. (Jeff!)
