

Toronto Chapter's January Meeting

The Society kicked off the New Year with a well attended meeting. Our new president Duncan Johnstone welcomed everyone and reminded attendees we are looking for volunteers to help out the Society. The OMSS is looking for someone to chair the Technical Committee to help the club leverage technology to keep members better informed, preserve our history and attract new members.



David Dorward delivered a very interesting presentation on the Red Baron covering his funeral and explaining how his plane was stripped by souvenir hunters after crashing.



Frank Mackay provided an update on behalf of the calendar committee. He mentioned the OMSS is one of few clubs that still print an annual calendar and it is a major expense for the club. Frank recommended the executive committee review options to address the cost of calendar printing and mailing as it is one of the largest expenses the club incurs. The calendar committee will now stand down until April, and at that time Frank will be looking for new members to join the committee to help in creating the 2026 calendar.

Our treasurer, Gary Lenius provided an update on the club's financials which remain solid and basically un-

changed from his report at the AGM. Despite the added expenses in 2024 resulting from lawyers fees to complete the provincial governments new non-profit reporting rules, it is forecasted the club will be able to cover expected expenditures for 2025.

Jeff Duncan provided an update on the 'club table' sales and thanks to donations from club members, he raised a record amount of money in 2024 which helps cover club expenses and keep membership costs down.

An interesting show and tell was held with Keith Richie demonstrating how confusing and inconsistent the temporary GST tax rules are and how it applies to some model

Tech Tip of the Month—How to make a replacement box

Are you missing a box for that special piece?

Jeff Duncan explains how to manufacture a replacement box at home using an existing box as a template.

You really only need pretty basic software, for example I used Microsoft Word and a colour printer.

Take the photos of the original box flattened out





Insert the photos into your software program

Use the rotate, enlargement, mirror image etc. tools to format the layout

Print test copies using regular printer paper to adjust the formatting to get the size you wish

Cut out a test 'final' version using regular paper again to know what and where to cut

Print the finished box using some type of card stock paper. (I used ivory colour to give an older look)

This was a fun project and is pretty simple after you do the first one.

Wow! Has Armies in Plastic ever been busy. They have recently released several new artillery sets featured around garrison artillery, Civil War mortars and their new 4.7 Naval Gun. The 4.7 Naval Gun was used in the Boer War and the First World War by Artillery units of the Empire. AIP is offering the gun separately moulded in various colours including Green, Tan and Grey. They have also introduced a number that can be purchased separately and a version featur-

ing an Indian Elephant. The separate gun sells for \$28.50 Cdn while the Limber is around \$15.75 Cdn. The first batch of sets with the elephant sold out quickly however there are more on the way. They will retail at approximately \$58.00 Cdn.

AIP has also released several sets featuring their new 1/32 Fortress guns. The two fortress guns released are an 18 pounder and a 24 pounder. The carriage was designed to be used on ships and in garrison emplacements and the AIP releases offer so many possibilities to collectors. As well as the new guns AIP has com-

bined them with various artillerymen covering the French & Indian War, American Revolution, Napoleonic Wars, War of 1812 and the Civil War. The two calibers of artillery are available in sets of three or a set with five artillery crew and one cannon of each caliber. All the Fortress Gun sets retail for \$19.00 Cdn.

William Britain Ltd's - 10th Royal Veteran Battalion, 1814

William Britain Limited has released several new figures recently but the ones that caught my eye were The 10th Royal Veteran Battalion Private from the War of 1812 and the new French Imperial Guard Grenadier Officer with the Eagle Standard. The 10th Veteran Battalion was distributed to several garrisons during the War of 1812. It was made up of older and less fit soldiers who had served in other units. At the start of the war the garrison at Fort St. Joseph went on the offensive and helped capture the American Fort Mackinac on the upper great lakes. They also participated at River Raisin and Fort St. Stephenson. This figure will retail at approximately \$69.00 Cdn. The Eagle on the French Regimental Standard was touched by Napoleon himself, thus when an Eagle was lost in action it was extremely humiliating to a Regiment. There are several new figures that are available to support the new Imperial Grenadier Guard in the defense of the Regimental Eagle including a Drummer and two other Grenadiers. The Eagle Bearer is approximately \$98.00 Cdn while the Drummer is \$75.00 and he Grenadiers are \$69.00 Cdn each.



Daring SAS raid to liberate hundreds from concentration camp revealed after 80 years

One of the SAS' most daring and outlandish missions of the Second World War has finally been revealed after 80 years. The raid deep behind enemy lines on a concentration camp in Nazi Germany-occupied southern Italy to free almost 200 Jews and other prisoners was pulled off by the Special Air Service in September 1943. It had largely been forgotten about, but thanks to research by historian Damien Lewis the audacious prison break has come to light at last.

The raid occurred on the night of 13 September 1943, days after the Allies landed in Italy. At that time, the plight of those held in concentration camps across Europe was largely unknown to Allied commanders.

But that all changed when an escapee from a camp managed to find the Allied headquarters in southern Italy, informing the officers that the prisoners were about to be transferred to another camp in Germany.

Within hours, a plan was hatched to mount an operation to liberate the camp, freeing those being held by the Italians.

'There is no other mission like it'

Incredibly, the operation had been unknown until now, omitted from the commonly understood history of the Second World War. That's all changed thanks to author and historian Damien Lewis, who has written about the raid in his new book SAS: Forged In Hell.

Speaking to Forces News, Mr Lewis said: "To discover a mission of this unprecedented scope - there's nothing else like it during the war. There is no other mission like it."

The commander of the raid, which was carried out by SAS operatives including a contingent from the French Foreign Legion, was Major Oswald Carey-Elwes, who had been recruited to the SAS by the regiment's founder, David Stirling.

His plan for the prison break involved the hijacking of a train. "The idea comes to the fore that they should hijack a train," Mr Lewis said. "Steam the train through 100 kilometres of enemy territory. Get to the concentration camp, overcome the defences, load the train with all the inmates from the concentration camp and steam the train back again."

After killing the guards, the SAS captured the camp commandant, described by Mr Lewis as a "die-hard Italian fascist".

He added: "They see an Italian train steaming up to the camp. What's there to be suspicious of?

"It's only when they burst off that train and storm into the camp, guns blazing, that the enemy guards realise that this is an assault. "It's inconceivable to them that this is really happening.

"And they take the camp by such surprise that they manage to capture the camp commandant, too, before steaming the train back again."

Too far-fetched?

This incredible story has been - at least until now - unknown beyond those who took part in the operation and the Allied commanders who ordered it be carried out.

Asked why there had been so much secrecy around the operation, Mr Lewis said a mission of such daring and success was almost "unprecedented". He said: "My theory is that if you publicise the concentration camps to the British, American and wider Allied publics, it would demonise the enemy. "That would make them less likely to surrender, and the war would go on longer."


