You will find in The Toy Soldier Shop of Washington, D.C., several thousand figures displayed in antique showcases. Toy soldier books, wooden castles and a remarkable selection of original WWI posters round out the offerings therein. Neil Rhodes' shop occupies the first floor of a beautifully restored double parlor row house and he's there most every Saturday, holding toy soldier court and creating his own contemporary toy soldiers. Neil's painting skills and attention to detail are unsurpassed. Repairs, conversions or original commissions are eagerly and exquisitely rendered.



B] HEYDA Toy Soldiers

Heyde figures originated in Dresden, Germany and are among the most prized in the world. The company produced figures mainly in the 48- and 60-mm scale. The company was bombed out during World War II, so its products became highly sought after post WW II. A few good books have been produced on this company, but its history is not well known amongst many English-speaking collectors. We do know that it was a thriving company producing such lines as Egyptians, Trojans, Greeks including a temple, a Trojan horse, War elephants, Alexander the Great sets, Romans, Chariots, Medieval Knights, Buffalo hunts, Cowboys and Indians and a Stagecoach

Welcome to The Toy Soldier Museum -- a treasure trove for toy soldier collectors, military historians - anyone with an interest in history and a curious mind. The Toy Soldier Museum collection is unique in the world.

Tens of thousands of military miniatures are arrayed in creative dioramas depicting scenes from Ancient Egypt to the present day. The collection represents every major and many less well-known makers from around the world.

W. Britain, King & Country, Pixi of Paris, Sarum Soldiers, CBG Mignot, Trophy Miniatures of Wales, Little Lead Soldiers, St. Petersburg Collection, and dozens of other makers are represented here. A toy soldier collector's dream!

Assembled over a lifetime, many figures are one-of-a-kind and out of production.

The 3,000 square feet of historical displays are presented against a backdrop of militaria and royal memorabilia: medals, uniforms, military regalia, artifacts of the British royal family starting with Victoria, British Regimental drums, an extensive collection of royal commemorative porcelain, bone china sculpture, and dozens of unique artifacts.

D] G.I. Joe

The original idea for the action figure that would become G.I. Joe was developed in 1963 by Stanley Weston, a Manhattan licensing agent. Weston made rudimentary prototypes of the figure and basic marketing materials that showed the sales potential of a military action figure.

Created by Donald Levine circa 1964

G.I. Joe is an American media franchise and a line of action figures owned and produced by the toy company Hasbro. The initial product offering represented four of the branches of the U.S. armed forces with the Action Soldier (U.S. Army), Action Sailor (U.S. Navy), Action Pilot (U.S. Air Force), Action Marine (U.S. Marine Corps) and later on, the Action Nurse. The name is derived from the usage of "G.I. Joe" for the generic U.S. soldier, itself derived from the more general term "G.I." The development of G.I. Joe led to the coining of the term "action figure". G.I. Joe's appeal to children has made it an American icon among toys.

The G.I. Joe trademark has been used by Hasbro for several different toy lines, although only two have been successful. The original 12inch (30 cm) line introduced on February 2, 1964, centered on realistic action figures. In the United Kingdom, this line was licensed to Palitoy and known as Action Man. In 1982 the line was re-launched in a 3.75-inch (9.5 cm) scale complete with vehicles, play sets, and a complex background story involving an ongoing struggle between the G.I. Joe Team and the evil Cobra organization which seeks to take over the Free World through terrorism. As the American line evolved into the Real American Hero series, Action Man also changed, by using the same molds and being renamed as Action Force. Although the members of the G.I. Joe team are not superheroes, they all had expertise in areas such as martial arts, weapons, and explosives.

G.I. Joe was inducted into the National Toy Hall of Fame at The Strong in Rochester, New York, in 2004 and into the Pop Culture Hall of Fame in 2017.

What Does "GI" Stand For?

"GI Joe" is a household name. Originally, GI stood for "Galvanized Iron", the primary material used to make military items, i.e., buckets. However, as the military grew and evolved over time, GI took on multiple meanings, including "Government Issue", "General Issue", and even "Ground Infantry". With all that said, the title "GI Bill" seemed only fitting. [In the modern era do not forget Gastro Intestinal as in the old tract – maybe GI Joe is a doctor?]

F] M36 tank destroyer

The M36 tank destroyer, formally 90 mm Gun Motor Carriage, M36, was an American tank destroyer used during World War II. The M36 combined the hull of the M10 tank destroyer, which used the M4 Sherman's reliable chassis and drivetrain combined with sloped armor, and a new turret mounting the 90 mm gun M3. Conceived in 1943, the M36 first served in combat in Europe in October 1944, where it partially replaced the M10 tank destroyer. It also saw use in the Korean War, where it was able to defeat any of the Soviet tanks used in that conflict. Some were supplied to South Korea as part of the Military Assistance Program and served for years, as did re-engined examples found in Yugoslavia, which operated into the 1990s. Two remained in service with the Republic of China Army at least until 2001. The vehicle is also known by the nickname General Jackson, or just Jackson, which was originally assigned to the vehicle by the Ordnance Department in November 1944 for publicity purposes, such as in newspapers, but does not appear to have been used by troops in the field during the war.

M10 tank destroyer



The M10 tank destroyer, formally known as 3-inch gun motor carriage M10 or M10 GMC, was an American tank destroyer of World War II. After US entry into World War II and the formation of the Tank Destroyer Force, a suitable vehicle was needed to equip the new battalions. By November 1941, the Army requested a vehicle with a gun in a fully rotating turret after other interim models were criticized for being too poorly designed. The prototype of the M10 was conceived in early 1942 and delivered in April that year. After appropriate changes to the hull and turret were made, the modified version was selected for production in June 1942 as the "3-inch Gun Motor Carriage M10". It mounted the 3-inch (76.2 mm) gun M7 in a rotating turret on a modified M4 Sherman tank chassis. It was built in two variants. The M10 GMC used the M4A2 Sherman chassis and the M10A1 used the M4A3 chassis. Production of the two models ran from September 1942 to December 1943 and October 1942 to November 1943, respectively.

History Works, owned and operated by Richard Walker, the former general manager of Britains, offers beautifully sculpted and excellently painted metal figures at reasonable prices. **Formerly known as Del Prado**, which pioneered budget-conscious soldiers for novice as well as experienced collectors. Because History Works' many ranges cover a wide variety of historical periods, most collectors will be able to find something to suit their taste.

H] Airfix

Airfix is a British brand and former manufacturing company which produced injection-moulded plastic scale model kits. In the UK, the name 'Airfix' has become practically synonymous with plastic models of this type, "they became a sort of generic name for any plastic, injection-moulded model kit". Airfix manufactured a wide range of plastic model products such as cars, aircraft, ships, commercial vehicles, military vehicles, railways, and figures. Founded in 1939, Airfix was owned by **Humbrol** from 1986 until the latter's financial collapse on 31 August 2006. Since 2007, both Humbrol and Airfix have been owned by **Hornby.**

Airfix was founded in 1939 by Hungarian businessman **Nicholas Kove**, initially to manufacture inflatable rubber toys. The brand name was selected so that it would be alphabetically the first in trade directories. In 1947, Airfix introduced injection moulding, initially producing pocket combs. In 1949, the company was commissioned to create a promotional model of a Ferguson TE20 tractor, moulded in cellulose acetate plastic and hand-assembled for distribution to Ferguson sales representatives. To increase sales and lower production costs, the model was sold in kit form by Woolworth's retail stores.

In 1954, Woolworth's buyer Jim Russon suggested that Airfix produce a model kit of Sir Francis Drake's Golden Hind, then being sold in North America as a 'ship-in-a-bottle', made in the more stable polystyrene. To meet Woolworth's retail price of two shillings, Airfix packaged the product in a plastic bag with a paper header that had the assembly instructions on the reverse. Its huge success led the company to produce new kit designs. The first aircraft kit was released in 1953, a model of the Supermarine Spitfire Mk I, followed by the Spitfire Mk IX in 1958, in 1/72 scale, developed by James Hay Stevens.
